

Cleaning Policy 2023























Purpose

This policy is designed to manage the cleaning and maintenance of Lantern Academy. It should be used in coordination with Lantern Academy's Health and Safety Policy.

Key roles and responsibilities

- 1. The Head of Education has overall responsibility for the implementation of the Cleaning and Maintenance Policy of Lantern Academy.
- 2. The Head of Education has overall responsibility for ensuring that the Cleaning and Maintenance Policy, as written, does not discriminate against any of the protected characteristics.
- 3. The Head of Education has responsibility for handling complaints regarding this policy as outlined in the Academy's Complaints Policy.
- 4. The Head of Education will be responsible for overseeing the day to day cleaning and for organising a scheduled deep clean annually or in accordance with the cleaning schedule.
- 5. The cleaning and maintenance staff are managed by the Head of Education.
- 6. The Head of Education will be responsible for the day-to-day implementation and management of the Cleaning and Maintenance Policy of Lantern Academy.
- 7. The cleaner will be responsible for all equipment used in the maintenance of the school premises.

Cleaning

- 1. The school's Cleaning Risk Assessment will be reviewed annually.
- 2. If instructions on cleaning chemicals recommend that eye protection should be worn, this must be done.
- 3. Products must be diluted as directed.
- 4. Cleaning products must not be mixed.

- 5. Bodily fluids, blood and vomit must be cleaned as soon as possible after they are discovered to prevent the spread of communicable diseases.
- 6. To avoid cross-contamination, different cloths must be used for different areas.
- 7. The school will be cleaned to the highest of standards.
- 8. During outbreaks of infectious disease, the President of Golden Mosque has the authority to close the Academy and mandate a deep clean.
- 9. Cleaners will refer to COSHH (Control of Substances Hazardous to Health) Regulations for further guidance on cleaning chemicals
